Plan of Action 2010

This Plan of Action outlines the main activities that the Justice Studies Center of the Americas (JSCA) will develop during 2010 in order to fulfill its institutional mission in accordance with the lines established in its mandate.

The activities described herein will satisfy three strategic objectives, two of them substantive and one linked to institutional support: i) to promote sustainable civil and criminal justice reforms that make use of best practices detected in the region and around the globe; ii) to strengthen JSCA's role as a facilitator of information on the justice systems of the region; and iii) to achieve long-term financial sustainability for the Center.

Main areas of action:

I.- Support for Civil Justice Reforms

The work that JSCA has been developing in the area of civil justice will continue in 2010 through research that allows it to broaden available knowledge on the type of problems that reforms of this sector should address. The purpose of these efforts is to promote a deeper discussion and involve non-traditional actors in the design and implementation of the necessary changes.

Main objectives:

To continue to engage in an effort to approach the discussion from a public policy perspective considering variables that go beyond legal debate;

To design concrete solutions to problems identified in the area of civil justice.

1.1 Research

Item No. 1
Transforming Civil Justice in Ibero-America: Contents and Challenges
Objectives: To analyze the use of oral procedures based on lessons learned in current civil justice reforms such as the European model experience and Uruguay as well as the application of the Model Code for Ibero-America and to extract conclusions on the contents and challenges that countries that undertake procedure reforms should consider. This study and the experiences covered will be presented during three seminars on civil justice that will be held in Uruguay, Spain and Chile (see Item No. 3).

Objectives: To analyze the operation of oral procedures based on lessons learned from current reforms in the area and to extract conclusions regarding the contents and challenges that should be considered by countries that are undertaking procedure reforms.

II.- Support for Criminal Justice Reforms

JSCA will continue the work that it has done since its inception in the area of criminal justice through follow-up studies designed to strengthen criminal justice reform processes. It will focus on the implementation of reform processes, developing studies on four states in Mexico as well as Bolivia, Peru and the Chubut and Santiago de Estero Provinces of Argentina. The reports will be presented over the course of the year.

We also will continue to develop our proposals for solutions to the problems that justice systems are facing, particularly our research on crimes that have a significant impact on society, which began in 2009 with a comparative report on Argentina, Colombia, Chile, Peru, Venezuela and Mexico. This will be published and disseminated in the various countries. We also will make an effort to include experiences in innovation on this topic from the perspective of prosecution services.

One of JSCA's priorities is its work on pretrial detention. Last year, we explored the normative changes introduced as a result of criminal procedure reforms and the real impact that the new procedure systems have had on the use of pretrial detention in Bolivia, Chile, Colombia, Ecuador, Guatemala, Honduras and Venezuela. We will promote presentations on and discussions of these studies around the region and will develop new studies on countries with federal systems such as Mexico, Brazil and Argentina and on Peru, Haiti and Costa Rica.

The Center also will develop a virtual course on pretrial detention that will address comparative experiences, international standards, and pretrial services in the U.S. The final component was developed in the context of visits and internships for JSCA consultants in the U.S. begun in 2009.

Pretrial detention also will be the main topic of the next issue of Judicial Systems Journal, which will change to a virtual format in early 2010.

The JSCA Training Program will develop a program for judges in the context of our alliance with the Ibero-American Network of Judicial Academies. It will include an assessment of witness credibility based on the Canadian experience.

The VII Inter-American Program for Training Trainers for Criminal Procedure Reform will be held in 2010.

As has been the case over the past few years, we will implement training, technical assistance, monitoring and reform evaluation activities in cooperation with Training Program alumni. Such actions will be taken in response to specific requests when the sustainability of the proposal is proven and a contribution that is at least equivalent to JSCA's support is secured from a local counterpart.

2.1 Research

ITEM No. 4
Reports on the Monitoring and Evaluation of Criminal Procedure Reforms
Objectives: To study the results and impact of criminal justice reforms in the region. These studies form part of the work that JSCA has done in the countries of the region and are designed to generate empirical information on the achievements and obstacles experienced.

The purpose of the study will be to collaborate with the states in order to improve the operation of the new system and contribute to efforts being made by others to plan reforms by presenting lessons learned elsewhere. Studies also will be conducted in two provinces in Argentina (Chubut and Santiago del Estero), and a third will be completed in Bolivia in collaboration with Universidad Católica de Bolivia. There is a possibility that we will do a fourth study on the Peruvian provinces that have implemented the reform. The reports will be presented at different times throughout the year.
